RAILROAD COMMISSION SHIFT VOTER GUIDE

What is the Railroad Commission responsible for?

The Railroad Commission of Texas (RRC) is the regulatory agency that oversees oil and gas development, coal and uranium mining, and gas utility service in Texas. The RRC's decisions affect every Texan in some way, whether you live next to oil and gas development or pay a gas utility bill. Its mission is to serve Texans through stewardship of natural resources and the environment, concern for personal and community safety of enhanced development and economic vitality for the benefit of Texans.

Members of the three-person commission are elected statewide, not regionally. One seat is up for election every two years, in even-numbered years. Commissioners serve staggered six-year terms, and there is no limit to the number of terms a commissioner can serve.

What you need to know about going to the polls

Before Voting

Theck if you are registered to vote at votetexas.gov.

Find polling places on your county election website or at <u>VOTE411.org</u>.

Find a sample ballot on your county election website or call your county elections division for more information.

Day of Voting

Bring your sample ballot to the polls for additional support at the booth.

Bring one type of valid photo ID (see list below).

Try to vote early, between 10 AM - 4 PM if you plan to vote on election day, or allow extra time for long lines.

You'll need one of seven types of valid photo ID to vote in Texas:

Orphaned oil and gas wells

Venting and flaring at oil and gas wells

Tuesday, February 20, 2024: First Day of Early Voting Friday, March 1, 2024: Last Day of Early Voting Tuesday, March 5, 2024: Primary Election Day

Tuesday, May 28, 2024: Runoff Election Day

Saturday, April 13, 2024: Green Party Annual Election **Sunday, April 14, 2024**: Libertarian Party Annual Election **Monday, October 21, 2024**: First Day of Early Voting by Personal Appearance

Tuesday, November 5, 2024: General Election Day

A state driver's license (issued by the Texas Department of Public Safety).

A Texas election identification certificate (issued by DPS).

A Texas personal identification card (issued by DPS).

A Texas license to carry a handgun (issued by DPS).

A U.S. military ID card with a personal photo.

A U.S. citizenship certificate with a personal photo.

A U.S. passport.

To vote by mail, request a mail ballot application from your <u>Early Voting Clerk</u> in the county where you are registered or use this <u>application form</u>. Read the application instructions carefully, complete the application, and return it to your Early Voting Clerk. The last day your application can be received by your Early Voting Clerk is Friday, February 23, 2024.
